

18th Annual American Legion Veterans' Day Race

Friday, 11 Nov 1955 at Legion Hall in Uptown Butte

The race started 11 a.m., after Army doctor Captain Frank Siddell had examined the runners and found them fit for the event.

The 11 a.m. start also came after the traditional eleven minute salute of mortar shots fired on the minute. The usual troop of at least fifteen Legionnaires carried out the start and finish line procedures, and Police Chief Bart J. Riley detailed the lead vehicle and traffic control under hazardous weather conditions.

The Montana Standard reported that "A thick snowfall shortly before the race thinned out at starting time and the sun broke through the gray clouds, but the pavements were slippery under foot and the air was chilly as the 40 contestants, 26 from Central and 14 from Butte, crowded up to the starting line at Broadway and Dakota."

Butte Central's Tom Monaghan handled the snowpack best, winning in a time of 16:23. Monaghan's victory was not enough to stop Butte High from, once again, escaping with the team victory.

For the third consecutive year, Butte High won the team competition over Butte Central by the narrowest possible margin of 11 to 10, with points scored by the first six finishers on a 6-5-4-3-2-1 format. The Bulldogs also use that one-point difference to edge slightly more ahead of the Maroons' in the eighth year of the two teams' ongoing 11-year contest to decide final ownership of the Jack Pachico Cup. The Bulldogs now lead the evenly matched series by a combined score of 87-81

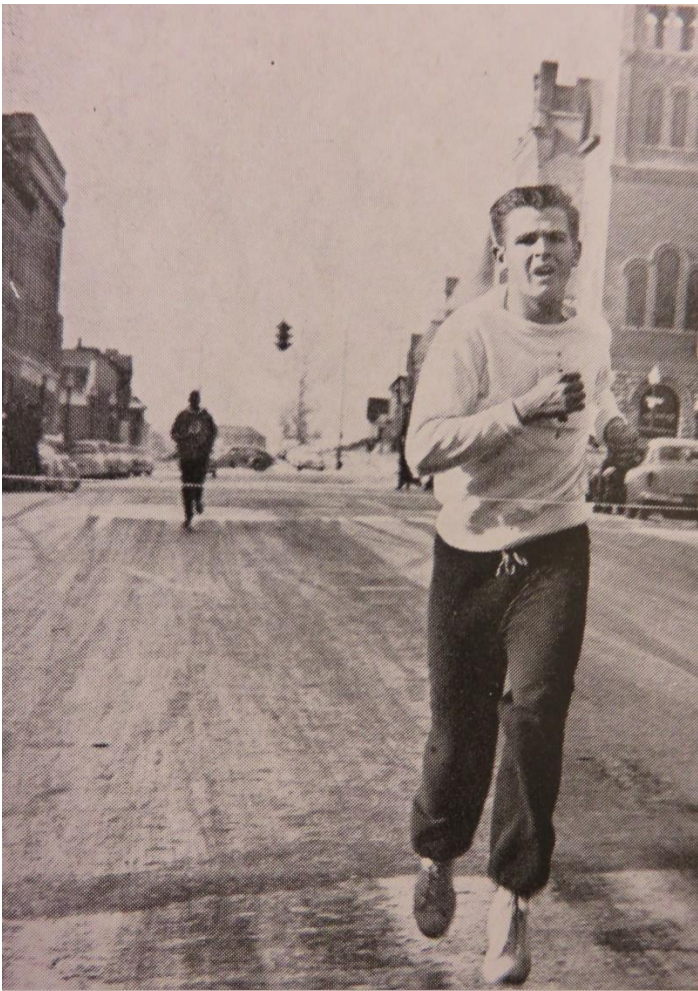

'Mighty Few People Live to Be 113,' Says Confederate Veteran at Birthday Party

FRANKLIN, Tex. (AP) — Walter W. Williams, oldest of the only four living Civil War veterans, joined in singing "Happy Birthday" to himself Sunday.

The frail, blue-eyed Confederate veteran will be 113 Monday.

"Mighty few people live this long," Williams said. Then he broke into a smile and sang "happy birthday, happy birthday" as his 84-year-old wife, Ella Mae, and five of his 12 living children gathered around his rocking chair to sing the traditional birthday greeting.

It may have been the last birthday party for the former forage master of Hood's Texas Brigade. The family said there will be no more public celebrations. They expressed doubt the annual family dinner will be continued. A final decision will be made later.

"We are doing this at mother's request," explained the "baby daughter," Mrs. Beatrice Bilmowice, Houston. "It is just too much strain on both mom and dad."

Eight children were among the 75 members of the family attending Sunday's birthday dinner. Included were 79-year-old Bud, the oldest living son, and the "baby boy," 32-year-old Gene.

Despite a cold, Williams, an honorary colonel on the staff of Texas Gov. Allan Shivers, got up at his usual 5 a.m. and spent the day in his new rocking chair.
